NATIONAL PARK STRIPES

Honoring America's National Parks

Since the early 1900s, Pendleton Woolen Mills has honored America's National Parks with a collection of distinctive park blankets. Glacier Park National Park Blanket was one of the first. Its historic markings and colors date back to the frontier trading posts. Traders would indicate the weight of the blanket offered in exchange for furs by holding up one finger for each pound. The original blankets incorporated three, four or five black stripes in the design, which indicated the value of the blanket. Colors and variations of the original striped theme have been adapted to reflect distinguishing characteristics of each park and blanket in the collection.



The Tucson area was originally home to the Pima tribe. A Pima legend says that in the beginning there was darkness, from which Creator emerged. He pulled a magic stick from his heart and formed a ball with its resin that grew into the Earth as he sang, "I make the world, and see, the world is finished...let it go, start it forth!" In this pattern, the magical creation stick helps bring the Earth, Stars, Moon and Sun from the darkness.



EAGLE ROCK

Mountain Vistas from a Bird's Eye View

The Eagle Rock Saddle blanket is named after a mountain summit in Apache County, Arizona. The eagle is sacred among Native American tribes. The Eagle Rock peak reaches more than 6,000 feet above sea level, a perfect perch for an aerie, giving the eagle a bird's eye view of the stunning vista below. Our Eagle Rock pattern incorporates Native American design elements and weaving traditions of the Southwest. It features a defined center element highlighted against a solid background. In combination with reflected side motifs on a striped ground, the design exhibits an artful sense of movement.

KIVA STEPS

Mankind's Place of Emergence

Kivas have been places of worship for many thousands of years. These square underground chambers are found in Ancient Puebloan cliff dwellings of the American Southwest. Kivas from earlier times featured a sipapu, a hole in the north of the chamber that represents mankind's place of emergence from the underworld. Modern Kivas are still built underground. A pattern of squared steps represents the physical and spiritual paths in and out of the Kiva, where modern Hopi people still gather for spiritual ceremonies.



ZAPOTEC

Elegant Simplicity of Zapotec Weaving

This blanket design was inspired by the 2,000-year-old weaving history of the Zapotec Indians of Oaxaca, Mexico. When Spanish conquistadores arrived in the early 16th century, the Zapotecs had already established a tradition of weaving colorful cotton cloth. The Spanish introduced sheep, the spinning wheel and the shuttle loom. Soon the Zapotecs were weaving beautiful designs in wool, using natural dyes from plants and animals. This pattern captures the classic geometric designs and elegant simplicity inherent in Zapotec weaving. The rich, dark red color reflects the beauty of the original, ancient dyes made from chochineal, an insect that feeds on cacti.

The Morning Star

The eight pointed star at the center of this contemporary design is based on a dramatic star quilt pattern that attained great popularity in the 1800s. Native Americans, especially those in the Great Plains area, had long used this same geometric figure to represent the Morning Star on hide paintings, beaded moccasins, leggings and dresses. When Native Americans artists began quilting, they made dazzling Morning Star quilts of their own, a tradition that continues today.

YAKIMA CAMP STRIPES

A Campfire Favorite

Our camp blankets and throws are favorites around the campfire and in front of the fireplace. These stripes were inspired by the ombre blankets that cowboys carried on their saddles to unroll when they made camp after long days of riding the range. Modeled after the material used in blankets by early shepherds to brave the elements of the Pacific Northwest, Yakima Camp Stripes in richly colored mixed yarns and iconic stripes are woven in rustic patterns that work inside and out.

CHIEF JOSEPH

Thunder Rolling Down the Mountain

Designed early in the 1920s, the Chief Joseph design continues to be one of Pendleton's most popular blankets. It commemorates the heroism of one of the Northwest's greatest Nez Perce leader, Chief Joseph. His Nez Perce name was "Hin-mah-too-yah-lat-kert", which means Thunder Rolling Down the Mountain. The Nez Perce were known for their skills as warriors, breeding of Appaloosa horses, support and guidance for the Lewis and Clark Corps of Discovery, and their peace efforts with the US Government. The Chief Joseph blanket is the oldest ongoing blanket produced by Pendleton Woolen Mills. Its design is balanced with arrowheads symbolizing bravery and pointing in all directions of Mother Earth.



CANYONLANDS

Sunlight Across the Canyons

Tall pinnacles of rock form breathtaking vistas along the skyline of Utah's Canyonlands. This unique Pendleton reinterpretation of an ancient Native American pattern uses a modern ombre weave to create rich layers that mimic the movement of sunlight dancing across the canyons. The northern and southern regions of the area include Arches of National Park, Canyonlands National Park, Moab, La Sal Mountains, Monument Valley, Natural Bridges National Monument and Lake Powell.

LAHAINA WAVE

The Undulating Waves of Lahaina

Aloha to Lahaina on the island of Maui, once the capital of the Kingdom of Hawaii. The Lahaina Wave blanket salutes the islands and surfers, then and now. In 1779, the log of Captain Cook's expedition ship HMS Discovery, recorded the first European written description of Hawaiian surfing. By then, surfing was an art and popular sport among native Hawaiians. Chiefs or kings were proud to show their mastery of the waves, and surfing was known as the "sport of kings". The design of this blanket combines traditional tribal inspired designs from the mainland with undulating waves of blue and turquoise representing the waves of the beaches near Lahaina - and every surfer's dream. The wave images are outlined in a sawtooth design that evokes the power and challenges of the surf.

FALCON COVE

Magic Rocks Beach

A hidden beach on Oregon's coastline holds Falcon Cove. This secluded spot is home to "Magic Rocks Beach," where ocean-tumbled stones make a rumbling music when washed by the tides. The natural hues of sand, grasses and seaside bluffs are arranged in a balanced pattern that represents the harmony of this beautiful stretch of coastline, where thousands of birds nest each year. This misty, rain-washed country is the traditional home of the Clatsop peoples, one of the many coastal tribes that lived where the Columbia River meets the Pacific Ocean.
